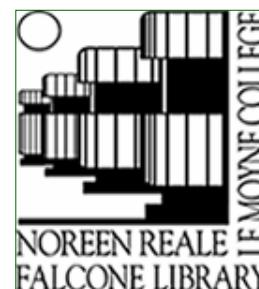

Exhibition: Picturing Faith: Religious America in Government Photography, 1935 - 1943

Fall Workshop Series Muserlian Instructional Lab

Now through October the Wilson Art Gallery is the home of a traveling exhibit featuring historical photographs surveying religious life in the America of Franklin Delano Roosevelt. In order to generate support for New Deal reforms, the Farm Security Administration began making a photographic survey of Depression-era America. Roy E. Stryker, well-known photographer, sent out his team of photographers (Walker Evans, Dorothea Lange, and Gordon Parks, John Collier, Jr., Marion Post Wolcott, Russell Lee, Jack Delano, and Marjory Collins) to the homes and churches of the poor and the middle class.

They photographed people in prayer, domestic shrines, churches, revival meetings, and even gathered around the gospel trucks of itinerate preachers. Supported by a grant from the Lilly Endowment, the exhibition includes forty-five black-and-white photographs from the Library of Congress.

Accompanying the photographs are explanatory materials. Viewers will have an opportunity to consider how religious images were used in the political agenda of the New Deal and how people during this period experienced the sacred in their lives.

Colleen McDannell, Sterling M. McMurrin Professor of Religious Studies at the University of Utah, is curator of the exhibition. She is the author of *Picturing Faith: Photography and the Great Depression, Material Christianity*, and, with Bernard Lang, *Heaven: A History*, all published by Yale University Press. She will visit Le Moyne to lecture on the exhibition (October 5), meet with classes, and give several gallery talks.

The exhibition and McDannell's visit are funded by the Le Moyne College O'Connell Professorship, Office of Student Development, and Department of Religious Studies. It is coordinated by Darryl Caterine, Assistant Professor of Religious Studies

Connect NY and Interlibrary Loan: What's the difference?

Connect NY and Interlibrary Loan are both methods for obtaining materials that are not available in the Falcone Library. You can use both these services when a book is either checked out of the Library or if the Library doesn't own the book. The following is a summary of the major differences between the two services:

- ◆ Connect NY is a shared catalog of participating academic libraries in New York State that allows users to borrow materials from other Connect NY libraries. Interlibrary Loan is a service that enables Le Moyne students, faculty, staff and alumni to obtain materials that are not owned by the Falcone Library or are not available in Connect NY. Interlibrary loan materials are borrowed from libraries all over the United States.
- ◆ Journals, reserve items, and non-book materials can never be borrowed through Connect NY. However, you can obtain books, journal articles and some non-book materials through Interlibrary Loan. Journal articles, in particular, are only available through Interlibrary Loan.
- ◆ To place a Connect NY request, you can search Simon, the online catalog of the Falcone Library, and click on the Connect NY icon at the top of your screen. Or you can go directly to <http://www.connectny.info> and place a request. To place a request, you will need your name and barcode number as they appear on your Le Moyne identification card.
- ◆ You can use an electronic interlibrary loan request form to place an Interlibrary Loan request. These forms are available through the Library's home page or directly at http://www.lemoyne.edu/library/ill/ill_request_forms.htm.
- ◆ Connect NY books circulate for 21 days and are picked up from the Circulation Services Desk at the Noreen Reale Falcone Library. Interlibrary loans circulate for an amount of time specified by each lending institution, and can be picked up at the Reference Services Desk.
- ◆ Interlibrary loans generally take longer to receive than Connect NY requests. Books requested through Connect NY will typically arrive at the Falcone Library within 2-4 working days, while Interlibrary Loan requests may take between 2-21 days.

If you are ever in doubt about whether to place a Connect NY request or an interlibrary loan request, just ask at the Reference Services Desk. The staff at the Noreen Reale Falcone Library will always do their best to get you your requested item in as fast and easy a manner as possible.

User Education Programs for First-Year Students: Three-Pronged Approach

AVS 101, the required one-credit course for first-year students, has added a second session on library assistance. At the request of the Advisement Committee, Inga Barnello designed a PowerPoint presentation on the basics of library services titled "**Overview of Library Services: Libraries Make Life Easier.**" It introduces students to the layout of the library, its services, such as reserve readings, interlibrary loan, and Connect NY, selecting a database from the library web page, and an overview of the library's collections.

AVS 101 will continue to offer the **Academic Integrity Tutorial: "Ethics of Information: Intellectual Property, Copyright and Plagiarism,"** inaugurated last year and newly revised by Gretchen Pearson, Bill Thieke and the fine people in Classroom Services. The tutorial and its quiz are mounted on the AVS 101 Blackboard account, along with the new PowerPoint file on library services.

These two components to the library's user education programs complement the long-running **HST 101 Research Strategies Workshops** offered as part of the core courses of Western and World Civilization. Multiple offerings of this workshop will be held throughout October and early November.
